chance to catch up. The students also had an opportunity to meet with prospective students who came to learn more about the program. The group was joined by SPS friend and special guest Rwandan Ambassador Zac Nsenga and many friends of the SPS in Memphis.

Upon returning from Washington last summer, Hanover did precisely what SPS students are encouraged to do: He maintained contact with the many public officials whom he met during his four weeks in the program, including Ambassador Nsenga. Wanting to share a bit of his SPS experience with his Ridgeway High School classmates, Hanover invited the ambassador to Memphis to meet with students to discuss the challenges Rwanda faces as it tries to recover from the genocide of the early 1990s. The ambassador met with key civic leaders in the community and toured the National Civil Rights Museum.

Other SPS students are following Hanover's example by inviting SPS speakers to their communities. As SPS becomes more firmly established, additional regional events will provide greater outreach and expand the impact of the program.
